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Goals and Objectives

The goal of this project is to create a safe and creative learning environment for kids made by kids where students not only felt welcome, but blossom and shine to their full potential and beyond as they take control and ownership of their learning.

Course Outline / Overview

"Flipped" Classroom Makeover was inspired by the program, Flip This House, on HGTV, where people take old and ugly houses and give it a makeover with a specific budget to sell later on for a profit.

I have been in my classroom for over 6 years and it was time for a makeover. I wanted to use the money that they we're allotted yearly so it would be cost effective to me and any teacher that wanted to use and adapt my project.

Instead of me picking what I think kids would like in terms of a theme and decorations, I decided to let the students choose not only the theme but what I had to buy with the budget I gave them; thus the project was born. They were not allowed to go over their budget which included taxes and shipping and handling where appropriate.

The results were amazing. I was surprised at how engaged the students were that they were even talking about this project in the cafeteria and PE. Some students even involved their parents because they were not allowed to go over budget. They were researching stores, making spreadsheets and discussing color theory with the art teacher; these students are in 6th grade. They went above and beyond my expectations.

<u>Lesson Plans</u>

Depending on the grade level of the students, this project can be completed in as little as 2 weeks to as long as 5; it is the teacher's choice; I chose to do this project in 3 weeks.

Week	Activity
1	 Present project PPT and rubric. Distribute list of themes students can research for presentation. Brainstorm activity with justification. Group students and allow time to begin their research notes. These notes will be collected the day they present their project. Assign budget – \$350.00
